
All K9 Tales are based on real-life rangers and dogs, working in the field to protect wildlife. K9 Shikar and her handler Lucky operate in South Africa.


5 Reasons ELEPHANTS are Amazing!

They are the biggest mammals on earth & HIGHLY INTELLIGENT. Their brains have more neurons than humans have — they are smarter than some people.

They live in TIGHT-KNIT GROUPS led by a female, called the Matriarch. Other females, called Aunties, help care for the young.

Elephants have EXCEPTIONAL MEMORIES: during times of drought, the Matriarch often remembers places where water can be found even after decades. Elephants can recognize themselves in mirrors, which scientists believe indicates unusually high SELF-AWARENESS.

Elephants seem to feel EMPATHY they respond to what other elephants are feeling, care for the injured s MOURN their dead.

This means that during the 15 minutes or so it has taken you to read Shikar's Incredible Adventure, one elephant has died at the hands of a poacher somewhere in Africa.

Many of Africa's other endangered wildlife are also being decimated at a catastrophic rate. The value of the illegal wildlife trade is calculated to be over \$10 billion US every year.

Canines for Africa was founded in 2016 by Zimbabwean-born philanthropist and conservationist Vianna von Weyhausen, to help stem this slaughter of African wildlife. Through our South African based operational wing K9 Conservation, we train specialized dogs and their ranger-handlers, creating elite and highly effective K9 wildlife-protection and counter-poaching units. These are then deployed to reserves throughout Africa – and beyond – where poaching is causing the most harm to wildlife and to communities.

Unless we all do something, whether big or small, to protect our world's wilderness and wildlife, those who are young now may never get to see many of the wondrous animals with whom we share this planet. Furthermore, the balance of nature – so vital for the survival of all living creatures, including mankind – will be damaged beyond repair.
